# **Sample Text**

When politicians from other countries meet with one another, they often get together to weigh up each other's ideas as to how a state should be run. Such discussions can be mutually profitable and world leaders can gain a real useful insight into the problems that plague other nations. In recent times, the world has been deeply critical of Ahmadinejad's Iranian regime on the basis of its threatening nuclear weapons programme, whose inventory is only predicted to increase. Iran's oil exports constitute more than 50% of its state revenues, but as a direct result of its hostile behaviour, global oil prices have shot up. The USA and Great Britain have been particularly vocal in their criticism of Iran's aggression, but have deduced that expressing further aggressive behaviour themselves is not likely to be in their global interests. However, political commentators have noted that the results of the recent talks in March point to nothing but a stalemate.

# Glossary

#### 1) to deduce

to form an opinion about something based on the information or evidence that is available

- The brain permanently searches for temporal structure in the environment in order to **deduce** what will happen next.
- Cosmologists measure the age of the oldest stars and how fast the universe is expanding; from that information, they can **deduce** many things, including the age and shape of the universe.
- We **deduced** from his silence that he did not approve of our plan.

### 2) to weigh up (the ideas)

to consider something carefully, examining its pros and cons, before making a decision

- The finance department **weighed up** the new ideas for expanding to a second location, but determined that it would be too costly.
- Attitude studies suggest that when asked to state beliefs and attitudes, people
   weigh up the possible consequences before giving an answer.

#### 3) (useful) insights into the problem

an understanding of a problem that reveals its true nature or helps to solve it



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- This study offers **insight into** how globalization affects health in low-income countries.
- (These studies, however, provide little **insight into** what is occurring in family life that helps the students succeed at school)
- Astronauts' training includes simulated weightlessness using a special airplane; this simulation gives them **insight into** what movement will be like in space.
- The President's autobiography offers **insight into** the daily life of the country's leader and the problems he faced.

### 4) the results point to

the outcome of something indicates a trend or supports a conclusion

- The board of directors **pointed to** falling productivity to justify their decision to fire the new manager.
- **Pointing to** the results of a recent survey, he claimed voters were most interested in education and unemployment.
- All signs **point to** an economic recovery next year.
- The evidence presented during the trial clearly **pointed to** his innocence.

#### 5) to be critical of

to judge something; to express disapproval of somebody/something and say what you think is bad or negative about them

- Liberal politicians continue to be critical of the CIA's investigative techniques.
- Einstein was critical of Isaac Newton's theory that time and space are absolute.
- The newspaper was shut down for being too critical of the regime.

## 6) deeply critical vs absolutely critical

**deeply critical** – extremely disapproving of something

• Local citizens were **deeply critical of** plans to build the new highway through their neighborhood.

absolutely critical – extremely necessary for something

- Many parents responded that an organized daily routine was **absolutely critical** in helping them manage the care of their children.
- Appointing a new, energetic leader was absolutely critical to the company's survival.

## 7) to constitute (40% of smth)

to be a part of something larger; to make up the parts that, together, form something

- In the early 1940s, female workers in the US constituted the majority of the labour force.
- Nitrogen constitutes 75% of the Earth's atmosphere.



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• The costs of welfare and social security programs constitute roughly one third of all US government expenses.

# 8) on the basis of... we would predict

we form a prediction about a situation using certain facts, ideas, or statistics as evidence, which we name in this phrase

- On the basis of his past speeches, we would predict that this one will not last longer than fifteen minutes.
- On the basis of measuring light from the stars, Galileo predicted that the Earth moved around the Sun.<sup>1</sup>
